



# WEIGHBRIDGE RAILWAY MUSEUM OPEN DAYS

The weighbridge will be open for hot drinks, homemade cakes, a tour of the museum or just a chat on Tuesdays 9th November, 23rd November, 14th December and 28th December between 11am & 3pm.





To ensure a safe as possible environment we continue to use a one way system through the building with visitors entering through the front left hand door, walking through the three rooms and exiting through the front right hand door.

The first thing visitors see when they enter the building is a map of the line and underneath it the seven stations along the line. (photo above)

Following some discussion among the group, it became clear that the majority of members preferred an afternoon meeting, especially during the dark winter evenings. So for the foreseeable future, meetings will be on a Wednesday afternoon. The next meeting will take place on Wednesday 10th Nov at 2pm. New members welcome.

The main purpose being to discuss the construction of a 4mm layout of Bishop's Castle station. This would be a positive step forward, providing a meaningful project for the modelling group and when completed a valuable asset for the Weighbridge Railway Museum. Jonathan Moor has already started a 4mm model of the weighbridge which he intends to bring along to the meeting on Wednesday.

On the 4th of December Christmas Event Open Day, Jonathan has offered to demonstrate 4mm scratch building, and will bring the part built weighbridge with the exterior walls built, the window and door apertures cut, along with the chimneys and the false roof. He will spend the time on the day detailing it - with paper slates, doors, guttering and windows and perhaps some painting too.



New book of Cambrian Railways and Great Western Railway structure drawings

# Welsh Railway Records Volume 3: Railway structures in Wales and the Marches

The WRRC is delighted to be able to announce publication of a small book of scale drawings of Cambrian Railways and GWR structures in Wales and the Border Counties. The drawings were prepared by the renowned Mike Morton Lloyd and Trefor Jones, and are primarily based on measurements of typical Cambrian and GWR structures found across the Principality and Marches.

They are mainly reproduced at 7 mm/ft scale to aid modellers, and will form an invaluable resource for those wishing to produce authentic models of the Cambrian Railways and the GWR in Mid Wales and the Borders. Included are drawings of both small and large signal boxes of the type provided to the Cambrian by the Dutton company, station buildings from ranging shelters on halts such as Capel Celyn to the sizeable station building at Talgarth, and numerous small items ranging from bufferstops to the unusual wagon turntables and traversers on Aberdovey pier. Many are complemented by photographs.

### Another mystery from Jim and the Shropshire Chronicle!

The opening of the BCR in 1865 and the resulting celebrations are well documented. Jim found the original report of the event in the Shrewsbury Chronicle of 27/10/1865 which yields yet another mystery about the BCR.

The report says that the train started from Stretford Bridge, but the halt there opened in 1890, it's said, as that was the date it first appeared in the timetable. Was it actually constructed for the opening event?

A junction with the Shrewsbury to Hereford line was to be formed shortly, according to the newspaper report. How did an engine and eleven carriages reach Stretford Bridge in that case?

Plowden station was rapidly nearing completion at the time of the opening but there was no sign of a station at Bishop's Castle. How did the shareholders and dignitaries get off the train?

A "fine, commodious building, after the style of the stations on the Oswestry and Newtown line, is to be commenced forthwith", the report said.



Last week a message was received from someone who had been offered the old water tank from the old Bishop's Castle horse drawn fire engine. He was wondering whether it would be of any use to us for display outside the weighbridge, as the old fire station was next door to our site. By coincidence we had recently received a photograph of Emmanuel Beddoes in his fireman's uniform. Further enquiries resulted in this photo of the Bishop's Castle Fire Brigade in the yard of the Six Bells with Emmanuel second from the left on the engine. The chap with the chain of office

was identified locally as E. C. Davies who was the Mayor from 1915 to 1917. When the fire engine was needed, the first thing they had to do was to catch the horse. This led them to advertise that anyone who called them out had to provide their own horse according to a press report!
